Searching Databases

[WorldCat Local](#), for books/ebooks, video/streaming video, journal articles, use to request Interlibrary Loan

[EBSCOhost](#), for journal articles (including peer-reviewed articles); search [CINAHL](#)

[SAGE](#), for peer reviewed journal articles. See list of Cressman Library Nutrition journals at SAGE, p. 6.

[ScienceDirect](#), for peer reviewed journal articles

[PubMed](#), for peer reviewed journal articles, clinical trials

[Google Scholar](#), for journal articles. Great if you already have a citation and don't know what database it is in.

[E-Journals & Periodicals](#), for journal titles. Great if you have the name of a journal and need to know whether or not the library has access to it.

Other searches:

((Lipids OR fatty acids) AND oxidation)

Add “**nutrition OR diet**” and **intervention** to the search:

Nutrition AND intervention AND lipid AND metabolism

What to look for in a database:

How does the database sort the results? By most recent? By relevance?

Can the results be narrowed to the last 5 years or another date range?

Is the full text available? Can I limit to just what the library has access to?

What to look for in a journal or journal article:

Is it peer reviewed?

Use the EBSCOhost database cite tool to copy/paste the AMA citation for an article. Go to the detailed record by clicking the article title then select the cite tool.

Searching within Journals

There are peer-reviewed Nutrition journals that we have access to that may not be indexed in our databases. For these journals (many happen to be Open Access), try searching within the journal by going to the list of journals on the Nutrition LibGuide.

The journal links on the Nutrition LibGuide will take you to the library E-Journals & Periodicals database, aka Publication Finder. Search within the journal from there or better yet at the journal website.

If you search within the journal while you are in E-Journals & Periodicals/Publication Finder, you will see results displayed in a way very similar to CINAHL and other EBSCOhost databases. However, the journal title icon will display as a periodical instead of an academic journal and the peer-reviewed facet should not be selected.

Search at the journal website for better results.
